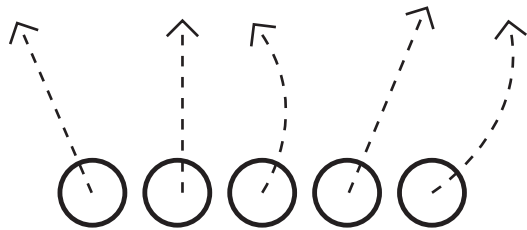


The goal of the game is that those in need receive as many balls as possible. Take 5 balls and start the game.

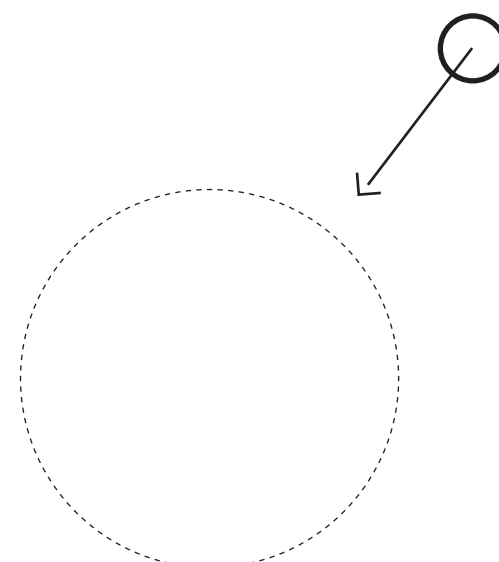
The risk is too high. Move forwards and give up 1 ball to an organization for administrative costs at the next station.



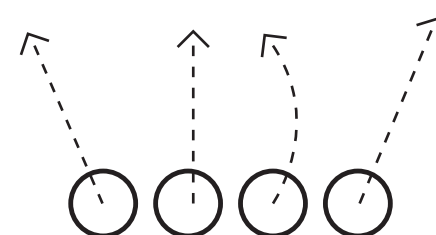
Donors

You give up a ball to an organization for administrative costs. By doing this you make sure that resources are available for both the selection and monitoring of projects, as well as for providing reports for the donors.



You are willing to take a risk and throw the remaining 4 balls to those in need. A lot of money will still be donated but the risk remains that it may not get through or that it will not be used sensibly.



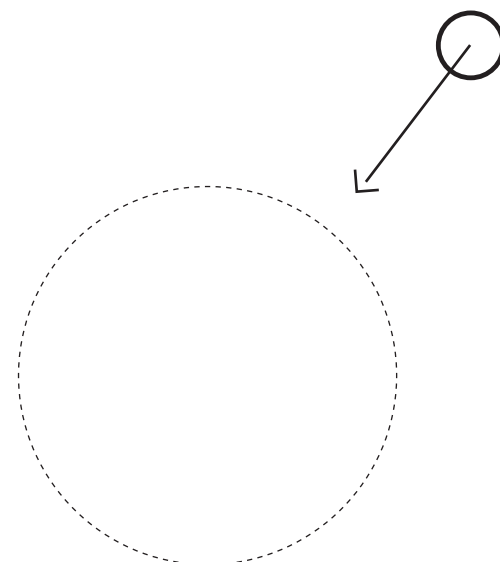

The risk is too high. Move on and give up 1 ball at the next station for the administrative costs of a project.

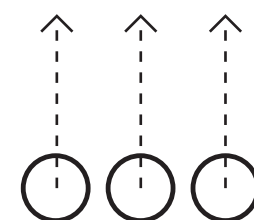


Organisations in high income countries
